### Open Forum, Introduction of Guests, and Acknowledgements

The Chairperson asked for the introduction of any guests present at this time and invite public comment.

## Student Senate

Joshua Wallschlaeger, Student Senate Officer, provided an update at this time.

Joshua shared that he recently utilized Campus Care located at NWTC and found it very convenient and helpful to have the option right on campus.

#### **NWTC Exclusive news:**

eSports Information: The Sturgeon Bay campus has undergone remodeling as well as the Marinette campus and created almost identical room layouts for our eSports program allowing teammates to play from campus to campus. This gives our teams an advantage within recruiting since it is very easily and much more accessible to join the team at a total of three of our campus'. The NWTC eSports team has also joined a national eSports association with thousands of other schools around the country. Reputable schools within our association include UW-Eau Claire and UW-Milwaukee. Other schools within the association include Lakeshore Technical College and Northcentral technical college.

**Recreational sports:** Volleyball and basketball have both begun their 2nd season this year with active participation allowing for multiple teams within both.

**Study Abroad:** The school has successfully hosted two of the trips abroad this year including trips to Mexico, and Barcelona. The 3rd and 4th trips to Scotland and Greece are approaching as Summer nears closer.

External Study abroad student: Joshua will be taking part in a study abroad trip to Tunisia, Africa thanks to the International Student Advisor, Sarah Conery, as well as Megan Popkey from Student Involvement's continued assistance in providing information regarding governmental study abroad program opportunities.

Joshua will be departing on June 3, 2023, and the trip will go on for about two weeks in which Joshua and other American students from around the country will take part global business classes along with Tunisian students. This is a sponsored trip by a federally endorsed program named EdAbroad in hopes to strengthen the connection between the American and African Economies. This is an exciting trip because three of our current international students, one working in Student Involvement, are originally from Tunisia.

WSG (Wisconsin Student Government) News: February 19-21, 2023, three of the Student Senate Senators including Joshua will be traveling to Madison to meet with governmental representatives to discuss legislative concerns and share WSG's position paper. They will discuss these concerns with representatives that the other senators as well as Joshua have contacted and scheduled meetings with.

# • Priority Concern:

Open Educational Resources (OER) - a program in which the state funds to provide textbooks and other required learning materials free on the internet for students to use to assist with the rising costs of college and allow access to education more easily obtainable by America's youth. These are typically formatted in the style of PDFs on the internet.

## • Secondary Concern:

Broadband access in rural or underprivileged areas - Government involvement and funding for the establishment of wider broadband or more internet connection all over the state giving students equal access to education regardless of their geographical living situation. This is a secondary concern because Student Senate discussed it last year with numerous representatives as well as this year and many of them have agreed and informed them of their current work within the communities they represent.

# Resolution Awarding the Sale of \$6,950,000 General Obligation Promissory Notes; Providing the Form of the Notes; and Levying a Tax in Connection Therewith

At its meeting on December 14, 2022, the Board authorized the borrowing of \$6,950,000 for FY 2023 capital budget needs (\$5,451,000 for moveable equipment, \$1,490,000 for building improvement, \$9,000 for site improvements). A draft resolution providing for the sale of General Obligation Promissory Notes in the amount of \$6,950,000, and specifying the amount of the tax heretofore levied, has been prepared by Bond Counsel and is attached as Board Exhibit 2. PMA Financial Network, Inc. will be soliciting competitive bids for the issue and presenting the bid tabulation and the winning bid for the sale of the notes at the meeting on February 15, 2023.

Dave Mayer moved that the Board adopt the resolution authorizing the sale of \$6,950,000 General Obligation Promissory Notes; providing the form of the notes; and levying a tax in connection therewith.

Motion seconded by Jeff Rickaby.

#### Minutes

The minutes of the January 18, 2023 Board meeting were sent to Board members prior to the February 15, 2023 Board meeting. It was recommended that Board approval be given for the January 18, 2023 Board meeting minutes.

# Voting of District Board Association budget

The District Board Association budget was provided to the Board during the January 18, 2023 Board meeting. It was recommended that the Board approve the District Board Association budget as presented.

#### Corporate Training & Economic Development (Contracts for Service)

Under the provisions of State Statutes 38.14 (3) and State Administrative Code WTCS 8, the District Board may enter into contracts to provide instructional or non-instructional services to public institutions, local governmental bodies, private institutions, industries, and businesses. District Board policy E240 delegates the authority to initiate a contract to the President, with the proviso that the contract is subject to retroactive approval by the Board. A report of fiscal year 2022 contracts pending Board approval is attached as Board Exhibit 3.

This report includes not only the in-district contracts but also the out-of-district and the out-of-state contracts. State Board Contract for Service Policy requires that the District Board receive a report at least quarterly on contracts entered into for which less than full cost is being charged. We have elected to provide the Board with this report on a monthly basis. This report uses a state formula in which the state annually calculates a percentage for indirect expenses (33.66% for on-campus and 27.75% for off-campus) such as administration, facilities, utilities, information systems, registration, counselors, insurance, etc., associated with a contract to determine full costs. The hourly rate of \$167.00 per hour along with the ability to project price was recommended by the department and approved by the Board. The intent is to recover the direct and indirect costs of delivering the services. Copies of the contracts are available for review by any interested person.

It was recommended that the Board approve the contracts for services identified in Board Exhibit 3.

Dave Mayer moved that the Board approve the consent agenda items as follows: January 18, 2023, Board meeting minutes, the District Board Association budget, and the contracts for services identified in Board Exhibit 3.
